
The Outdoor Glassroom

- A Handbook of Local Environmental Sites and Organisations for Education, Lifelong Learning and Play



















INTRODUCTION

There is a growing concern that, for a number of reasons, opportunities for outdoor learning have substantially decreased in recent years. This is despite the fact that evidence now suggests that fieldwork, properly planned and well taught, offers learners opportunities to develop their skills and knowledge in ways that greatly add value to their classroom experiences. Indeed, effective fieldwork can have a positive impact on long term memory and can lead to individual growth and improvements in social skills. A recent House of Commons Committee concluded that-

'Fieldwork clearly enhances the teaching of science and geography, but other subjects such as history, art and design and citizenship man also be brought to life by high quality educational visits. Group activities can develop social skills and give self confidence. Furthermore, outdoor education has a key role to play in the social inclusion agenda, offering children who may not otherwise have the opportunity, the simple chance to experience the countryside or other parts of our heritage that many others take for granted.'

This links so clearly with the aims of the Every Child Matters document and contributes in no small part to the personalisation agenda.

To quote Professor Tim Brighouse; 'One lesson outdoors is worth seven inside'.


Organising and conducting fieldwork with children, however, is not without its challenges for busy teachers. It takes time and knowledge and issues of health and safety can be daunting, to say nothing of the cost. In a city like Sheffield, however, there are vast opportunities for fieldwork relatively close at hand within the locality. Most schools are within walking distance of an area of ancient woodland, for example, and many schools have school grounds that present enormous potential for development. There is a network of nature reserves across the region, encompassing moorland, forest and wetlands. The region is so rich in heritage sites and museums that there are few aspects of the geography and history curriculum that cannot be illustrated at first hand. There are urban farms and heritage parks within the inner city. As well as this there are a number of organisations with skilled practitioners that can provide support on high quality, risk assessed activities both on your school site and at outdoor centres.



BOCAL GREEN SPACES

Parks & Countryside Ranger Service

The Ranger Service offers a wide range of activities, information, guidance and support to anyone who wishes to enjoy using Sheffield's green spaces. These include supporting communities, practical projects for people and wildlife, education and interpretation, health activities and acting as guardians of the city's green spaces. The Rangers offer support for schools during term and holiday times on developing your school grounds or using your local green spaces for education. Environmental activities linked to the National Curriculum include pond dipping, tree and bulb planting, bird and bat box making.

- Four Ranger teams cover green spaces within different geographic areas of Sheffield.
- S The Health Projects Team work city-wide, their work includes the Health Walks Project, part of a national project to improve the health of people in local communities by encouraging walking in the local environment, and the Growing Together Allotment Project.
- **Project Rangers** work on a number of projects targeted to improve specific areas. They aim to engage with the local community and schools and are extremely useful contacts for environmental activities with schools.
- S The Green Watch Project is a new community safety project forming part of the Crime and Disorder Strategy with four Rangers in key target areas.

Maintenance programmes and resources for schools have been delivered with respect to 35 areas of ancient woodland throughout the SY Forest area. Packs include woods fact-packs, poster and worksheet resource pack.

Teacher training days and staff meetings can be arranged on the use of local woodlands and school grounds.

Thornbridge Outdoors is the flagship centre run by Sheffield City Council that provides outdoor and environmental activities for day visits and residential groups. We have two self-contained residential units, the **Lodge** and the **Farm**. We also have a beautifully situated and sheltered **campsite** with showers, washbasins and toilets available to organised groups, that can accommodate up to 40 people. An added attraction of the Camp is the option of using the camp block with fully fitted large kitchen and dining room.

The Lodge accommodates a maximum of 32 people in 9 bedrooms with a dining room / kitchen, classroom / meeting room, shared recreation room and ample toilets, showers and washbasins. The kitchen is fully equipped, bedding is provided and the building is centrally heated.

The Farm is a Grade 2 listed 19th Century building with a charming roundhouse attached, accommodating a maximum of 29 people in seven bedrooms. Spacious dining room, fully equipped kitchen, showers, toilets and washbasins and a shared recreation / meeting room. Bedding is provided and all rooms are centrally heated.

Thornbridge Outdoors is licensed with the Adventure Activities Licensing Authority (Licence No: R0740) for the following activities: hillwalking and mountaineering, rock climbing, abseiling, caving, kayaking, open canoeing (inland and sheltered tidal water) and off road cycling.

On-site sessions are generally best in 1/2 day or 1/3 day (2 hour) sessions.

Two 1/2-day activities or three 1/3-day activities can be combined to make a whole day.

Environmental Art - in or outdoors, Nightline, Orienteering, Low Ropes and new High Ropes, Problem Solving, Practical conservation, Zip Wire, Nature trail, pond dipping and habitat studies, Climbing Wall and bouldering, Mountain Bike Course, High Ropes - Net & tree climb, Den Building, Camping.

Off site activities are mostly best as 1/2 day sessions. Some can be combined if they are in the same area (such as weaselling and climbing), or balanced with a half day on site session. The transport implications need to be considered. Climbing, Abseiling, Caving, Mine exploration, Cycling, Hill walking, Biking, Local & river valley walks, River Studies, Weaselling, Water Sports, Village studies.

Local Visits are generally 2 hour sessions and can be combined to make a day's activity (such as Pooles Cavern and a swimming pool visit in Buxton), or combined with another ½ day activity on site. Again, transport implications need to be considered. Matlock Mining Museum, Guided Local Farm Visit, Cauldwell's Mill, Castleton & Buxton Caverns, Mines, and the National Stone Centre are examples of such visits.

Mayfield Environmental Studies Centre 2303119

This well equipped centre, in the delightful Mayfield valley, is run by the Education Authority. There is a huge variety of curriculum linked activities that have been developed by the centre such as Development of a River system, Stream dipping related to Habitats & Food Webs, Tree study (and related activities on Materials) Land Use (diversification including local Alpaca farm)and many others that you can add, as well as themed walks based on geography, natural history, science, geology, local history and industrial archaeology. Termly training courses for teachers

Mixed working hillfarm on west side of Sheffield. Education staff, classrooms and a residential unit.

The education team at Whirlow aim to give all visitors a hands-on experience and further understanding of a real working farm. We aim to promote the links between how people can influence the farming environment and our strong dependence on farms. The team strives to provide access and opportunities for all including visitors, volunteers, colleagues and the wider community, giving everybody the chance to work and interact with the environment in a positive, safe and stimulating way.

Schools within the Sheffield LA have special rights for access to the farm as a learning tool for their children. Whirlow Hall Farm is open for day and residential visits all year round including the school holidays where scout, brownie and rainbow groups can take full advantage of our facilities.

Day visits are FREE for Sheffield LEA schools and we can also offer very low cost transport to and from the farm (minimal charge for non LEA establishments). Visits can range from a half day or full day programme including tailor made farm tours and environmental options suitable from nursery age up to secondary KS3 level: choose from minibeasting with our new video microscope, natural art and pony grooming amongst others – options change termly.

Residential visits are a fantastic way to explore a working farm in further detail - we have two farm buildings available for groups to use costing only a few pounds per child for Sheffield LA groups. The Hall is in the heart of the working farm and is a converted 19 th century farmhouse, sleeping 12 children and 2 adults. The converted barn is 5 - 10 minutes walk from the farm centre surrounded by peaceful open fields and is fully equipped to cater for additional support needs and wheel chair users. It also sleeps 12 children and 2 adults. All groups staying on the farm have the chance to assist staff daily with farm jobs and find out about looking after the animals. Wood Lane Farm, Wood Lane, Stannington

Wood Lane Centre, which is owned by Sheffield City Council and is run in partnership by the North Sheffield Conservation Group and the Sheffield Conservation Trust, is situated near Myers Grove School near Malin Bridge. It lies within a few minutes walk of the Loxley and Rivelin Valleys, both of which offer excellent opportunities for river, habitat and historical studies. The centre is housed in 200 year old stone farm buildings but recent renovation work has created superb facilities for environmental education including an oak beamed classroom or meeting room and extensive wildlife gardens that provide opportunities for pond dipping, minibeast hunts and wildlife habitat studies.

The experienced team officers led by Chris Nutton and Kevin Hill are available to work with schools on environmental education activities such as Woodland walks, Habitat studies, Environmental games, arts and crafts, Conservation activities and Training courses for staff.

Shire Brook Valley Local Nature Reserve Visitor Centre. 257 1176

The Shirebrook Valley is designated as a Local Nature Reserve and covers 100 hectares. This is a '**Wildspace'** project managed by the Ranger Service and local groups with funding from English Nature. Rangers can lead a range of activities in a number of habitats, including pond dipping. The site consists of a variety of habitats including wetland, woodland, lowland heath and ancient meadows. There are two Visitor Facilities available, one at Shirebrook Valley and one at **Birley Spa Bath House.** The Local Nature Reserve currently has a full time Ranger dedicated to supporting groups and providing educational activities and events. Groups or individuals wishing to organise visits should contact Chris Smith.

Kelham Island Environmental Education Centre, 201 0613 Kirsten Timms, Education Officer,

A very useful and interesting city centre purpose-built study site at the lower end of the island. Ideal for studying geography and the environment. Can be booked **free of charge** (plus museum charge of $\pounds I$ /child for Sheffield LA schools others $\pounds I.50$) Teacher led groups can request KSI-KS2 resource packs or can request an **Activity Session** led by on of the freelance educators. Old Moor is a haven for nature in the heart of the Dearne Valley - a stunning area of wetlands, teeming with birds and other wildlife. With an exciting indoor classroom, well-equipped visitor centre and a range of excellent education facilities, Old Moor is the ideal place to bring your class for an unforgettable experience of nature.

All the programmes are risk-assessed and linked to the National Curriculum. They focus particularly on Science, and are most suitable for children at KSI and KS2. A visit to Old Moor will increase your pupils' knowledge of the environment through experiential learning and help them understand the value of wildlife and natural places.

Old Moor's 100 hectares of diverse wildlife habitats ranges from open water, marsh and reedbeds, to flower-rich meadows. There is a superb visitor centre in restored farm buildings, which houses a classroom, shop, café and toilets. A number of bird viewing hides and wildlife ponds provide a great opportunity for pupils to get a closer look at the Dearne Valley's fascinating wild creatures.

We limit educational visits to a maximum of two classes (or approximately 60 children) at any one time. For most activities, classes will be split into groups of 15, each accompanied by at least one RSPB field teacher.

Charge per pupil: £1.25 Minimum charge: £30

With the support of the Heritage Lottery Fund, we are able to offer a number of FREE visits and travel bursaries – please call for more details.

The education programmes are full-day sessions (lasting approximately two hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon). We will adapt programmes to the age and Key Stage of your pupils. If the topic you would like to study is not here, please ask and we will do our best to accommodate your needs.

KSI FULL-DAY PROGRAMME

A Wild Adventure

This programme consists of four main sessions specifically tailored to this age range, giving a great overall experience of Old Moor's wildlife. The components of the programme are as follows: Pond dipping (I hour) Minibeast safari (I hour) Wildlife adventure walk (I hour) Birdwatching (I hour)

KS2 FULL-DAY PROGRAMMES

Habitats and adaptation

A chance to explore Old Moor's natural environment, looking at wetland, grassland and woodland habitats. By examining the creatures that live in these habitats, children will gain a greater understanding of how they are adapted to survive. The day will cover the following activities: Pond dipping,, Birdwatching, Looking at minibeasts, Examining vegetation, Measuring light and temperature, Comparing habitats

Food chains come alive

Take a closer look at Old Moor's wildlife, focusing on what eats what, and the arrangement of food chains and webs. We will examine in detail creatures in two different habitats, and play a number of food chain games that will reinforce

what the children have learned through first-hand experience. The day will cover the following activities:

Pond dipping, Birdwatching, Looking at minibeasts, Using simple keys, Learning food chain vocabulary, Playing food chain games

It's Great Outdoors! -fun activities for early years

Forest Schools is a powerful innovative educational approach to outdoor play and learning. The philosophy of Forest Schools is to encourage and inspire individuals of any age through positive experiences and participation in engaging and motivating achievable tasks and activities in a woodland environment, helping to develop personal, social and emotional skills: Independence, Self-discovery, Confidence, Communication skills, Raised self-esteem. These link directly to the **'Every Child Matters'** outcomes. Sheffield based Archimedes is a national leader in the development of Forest Schools.

A standard programme has been developed consisting of 12 sessions spread over the term. The sessions will be alternately delivered by the Forest School Leader and the Class Teacher. They will be designed to fit the curriculum requirements of the group and to complement the classroom learning.

All of the activities delivered are geared towards raising the levels of self-esteem and self-confidence in each child. This in turn will have a positive effect on their classroom development and peer relationships. Children who struggle in the traditional classroom setting will thrive in a positive outdoor learning environment and be able to demonstrate their creativity and true potential. This is the least altered workhouse structure in existence today and the regime of segregation, work and supervision is clearly portrayed in both the architecture and the stories of the people who lived and worked here. Consideration is also given to how things have changed today for the poor in Britain.

Charles Sabine Augustus Thellusson inherited the Brodsworth estate in 1859 and decided to commission a new mansion to replace the old 18th-century house. Designed in the Italianate style and decorated and furnished in the opulent fashion of the 1860s, it retains much of its original scheme to this day, making it one of England's most complete surviving Victorian country houses.

Bolsover Castle - Derbyshire 01246 822844,

'By an unlikely miracle,' wrote the historian and champion of the Castle, Mark Girouard, 'the keep at Bolsover has survived into this century as an almost untouched expression in stone of the lost world of Elizabethan chivalry and romance.'

Peveril Castle - Derbyshire 01433 620613

The tower of this Norman stronghold still stands to its original height This castle, perched high above the pretty village of Castleton, offers breathtaking views of the Peak District. Founded soon after the Norman Conquest of 1066

Arbor Low Stone Circle and Gib Hill Barrow - Derbyshire

A fine Neolithic monument comprising a recumbent circle of white limestone slabs, surrounded by a large ditch and bank.

Wingfield Manor - Derbyshire 01773 832060

A huge, ruined country mansion, Wingfield Manor was built in 1440 by Ralph, Lord Cromwell, Treasurer of England. Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned here in 1569, 1584 and 1585. Unoccupied since the 1770s.

Conisbrough Castle - South Yorkshire 01709 863329

The white, cylindrical keep of this 12th-century castle is a spectacular structure. Made of magnesian limestone, it is the only example of its kind in England. Recently restored, with two new floors and a roof, it is a fine example of medieval architecture.

Roche Abbey - South Yorkshire 01709 812739

Founded in 1147, the fine early Gothic transepts of this Cistercian monastery in South Yorkshire still survive to their original height. In the 18th century, Lancelot 'Capability' Brown transformed an already beautiful valley into a truly enchanting site.

Monk Bretton Priory - South Yorkshire

The sandstone ruins of a Cluniac monastery founded in 1153, plus the remains of the 14th-century gatehouse.

Haddon Hall is a fortified medieval manor house dating from the 12th Century, and is the home of Lord and Lady Edward Manners whose family have owned it since 1567.

Bishops' House is the best preserved timber–framed house in Sheffield. It was built around 1500 and is tucked away at the top of Meersbrook Park. Bishops' House typifies the development of the smaller English domestic house in the 16th and 17th centuries. Inside, the house retains many of its original features and looks just as it would have done in the 17th century, giving a tantalising flavour of Stuart England. The Great Parlour is restored as a typical dining room and the first floor chamber contains the original bedroom furniture and fittings listed in a 17th century inventory of contents. We have produced resources to support workshops and self-guided sessions at Bishops' House for Key Stage two pupils. All sessions support the History programme of study and units 8 and 18 of the QCA Scheme of Work:

· What were the differences between the lives of rich and poor people in Tudor times?

· How are our toys different from those in the past? - What were homes like a long time ago?

Manor Lodge is one of Sheffield's most significant heritage sites. In Tudor times it was one of the grandest manor houses in the land. It was visited by Cardinal Wolsey and was prison to Mary Queen of Scots for many of her 14 years in Sheffield. In later centuries it became a thriving centre for agriculture, craft and industry.

We have a range of equipment and resources to support these sessions and a free resource pack is available to any school booking a session Our sessions aim to give Key Stage 2 pupils an understanding of Tudor life through a varied approach using art, history, geography, English and citizenship. Sessions cost $\pounds 60$ and last for approx. half a day. Each session is design for one class to undertake at a time i.e. around 30 pupils.

Topics presently available are- Art at the Lodge, Art in Tudor Aristocracy, Sheffield & Manor Lodge Today, Tudor Geography, Terrible Tudor History, Tudor Toys (KSI), Poor and sick in Tudor times, Tudor Court.

A short distance from the A629 (Sheffield to Huddersfield Road) between the villages of Wortley and Thurgoland Wortley Top Forge is a Water Powered Iron Forge is a 17th Century Iron Forge, whose history can be traced back to 1640. It is acknowledged as being the oldest surviving Heavy Iron Forge in the World. Following the final abandonment of the site in 1929, various bodies have been involved in securing the site which now forms the heart of an Industrial Museum. Exhibits at Top Forge include the original water wheels and water powered drop hammers within the original Forge building that is progressively being restored to 1900s condition. All three Water Wheels can be run subject to conditions. Adjoining buildings house a 1920s Machine Shop, displays of medium sized and small stationary steam engines and displays of old machine and hand tools Sundays - February to November - 11 a.m. to 5 p.m (dusk when earlier). Other times by appointment Adults £3.00, Children 50p & O.A.P.s £2.00

Other Features- Picnic Area, Walks in surrounding Countryside, Toilets, Limited Light Refreshments. Miniature Railway - Operates most Open Days - from 2 p.m.
